year commences, Patrick, Jenni and Kyra are looking forward to working with you. Feel free to reach out as needed.



- All-Class Mentors: <u>For mentors of DPS high school students</u>, please contact the MCOCP staff if your mentee needs an RTA bus pass.
- All-Class Mentors: Please be on the lookout for forthcoming information on how and when to commence mentoring for the 2025-26 school year. You will receive a letter, school calendar, and liaison contact information via USPS. Most local schools begin in mid-to-late August through early September (right after Labor Day). See start dates on page four. The best practice is to give your mentee a couple of weeks to get settled into his or her school routine before scheduling your first visit. You can certainly work with your respective school liaison on setting up your meeting (especially for new mentors), but if you have an established process already, feel free to coordinate directly with your mentee.

Please complete the process as soon as possible. If you did not receive the email from Sterling Volunteers, check your spam folder or reach out to Patrick.
- Senior Mentors: In early Fall, Jenni will be visiting with seniors (Class of 2026) as they begin the college application process. Please tell your mentees that their high school liaisons will notify them when she will be in their building. Let them know that it is absolutely critical that they attend this meeting to learn about various Fall deadlines they must meet and other important information.
- Senior Mentors: Any seniors interested in attending Miami University MUST attend the Fall Bridges overnight event at the university. It is mandatory. Jenni will share more details with the senior MCOCP scholars, but the application deadline is due 9/26/25. NOW is the time for them to start completing the application. Questions? 
August Fun Facts and Dates to Remember

Montgomery County Ohio College Promise – A History in the Making for 15 Years and Counting

ontgomery County Ohio College Promise is celebrating its 15th anniversary. John N. and Connie Taylor created the program out of a desire to help young people have an opportunity to go to college and be successful. John shared that he would not have been able to graduate from college and become a successful businessman if his family had not helped him pay for his education. John and Connie witnessed the impact of college access programs in other communities, and they wanted to provide that opportunity to students locally.


In 2010, the Taylor family worked with local leaders to get the program off the ground. These individuals included Ned Sifferlen, Sinclair Community College President Emeritus and former Board Chair for the Dayton-Montgomery County Scholarship Program, and Mike Parks, President of The Dayton Foundation. They soon hired retired Centerville City Schools Superintendent Gary Smiga to serve as the founding Executive Director.

Together, the team designed the program and launched a campaign to raise \$6.2 million to fund 500 students over 10 years. Those leaders raised

\$6.4 Million through the generous gifts from individuals and organizations in the community. The first cohort of College Promise (CP) Scholars started high school in 2011.

The program has continued beyond those initial 500 students. Over 750 students have had the opportunity to have a mentor and pursue their college education at a regional partner college or university.

After the organization met another capital campaign goal of \$2.75 million to extend the program through 20 cohorts, the program

has raised \$10 million since its inception. And, the program mission has remained the same. To date, 65% of CP graduates have earned a college degree or marketable credential with little to no debt.

The current team is Executive Director Patrick Gill, who took over in 2017, Program Coordinator Jenni Guanciale, who has been with MCOCP since its founding, and Student Support Specialist Kyra Robinson, who has served in her role for nearly two years.
